Chick on a stick!




We have large numbers of grass snakes living in the fields, some of them up to around a metre long!



Both Common lizards and stoats took up residence in our brash/ woodpiles and produced young.



We have run 3 open days at the fields including for the Devon Wildlife Trust and the Devon Rewilding Network. More are scheduled for later this year.



We were visited by a Hobby in July 2023. This stunning falcon will have been hunting the large numbers of dragonflies breeding in our 16 ponds.

## The Flying Dormouse

Nick and Annie are now safely living on the Somerset/Devon border so no more 600 mile journeys from Edinburgh to look after the project. To celebrate, we have put the Roborough Rewilders logo on our van and The Flying Dormouse can now be seen in the lanes of Somerset and Devon.



## The Future

Roborough Rewilders is now a charity with four trustees, and our plan is to buy more land and spread the environmental word. If we can buy an area of field, we will be able to link up with two other "green" landowners and have over 100 acres managed in a way that is positive for wildlife. We are now applying for grants in order to raise funds for this and for the running costs of the charity and the work needed on the fields.

One of our fields is shown in the foreground, currently being grazed and browsed by some of local farmer, Neil's, beautiful Red Devon cattle. In the background are two fields which are planted with grass for sheep. You can see the contrast and the potential for biodiversity in our fields as opposed to very little in the sheep fields.
